2D Mixed Media Description

Students will experiment mixing 2 dimensional elements of printmaking, painting, drawing, photography and sculpture – and it is sometimes not quite flat at all! Printmaking is an artistic process based on the principle of transferring images from a template onto another surface, most often paper or fabric. Printmaking techniques we will use are reduction, collagraph, drypoint etching and mono-print. Mixed Media can also include just about anything found. **Art I and Art II are prerequisites for this course.**

Students will...

- Demonstrate an understanding of mixed media as a form of expression and creativity
- Complete work and develop skills in a wide variety of mediums
- Practice responsible attitude toward the care and safe use of mediums, tools and materials
- Develop the ability to critique/evaluate art work
- Develop individual thinking and problem solving skills
- Develop an appreciation for historical and cultural development in art works
- Use a printing press
