Sculpture Description

Students will learn to create 3D works of art in both relief and freestanding styles. Students will explore a variety of mediums: clay, plaster, wire, paper, concrete and other found objects. **Art I and Art II are prerequisites for this course.**

Students will ...

- Demonstrate an understanding of sculpture as a form of expression and creativity
- Complete work and develop skills in a wide variety of media
- Practice responsible attitude toward the care and safe use of art media, tools and materials
- Develop the ability to evaluate sculpture
- Develop individual thinking and problem solving
- Develop an appreciation for historical and cultural development in sculpture and develop an awareness of career opportunities

Sculpture Units

- 1) Connecting:
 - a) Reflect on their own personal story
 - b) Embed historical sculptures/artists within each unit
 - c) Develop Plans for projects
 - i) Creative/Personal Idea Generation
 - ii) Elements of Art & Principles of Design
- 2) Creating:
 - a) Plaster sculpture (subtractive)
 - b) Relief (Example: clay, cardboard, etc.)
 - c) Concrete (optional)
 - d) Free Standing (Example: clay, wire, etc.)
 - e) Mobile
 - f) Sculpture proposal
- 3) Responding:
 - a) Individual/Partner/Small Group/Large Group Critiques
- 4) Presenting:
 - a) Analyze, select and refine your work to make it worthy of presenting
